BETHLEHEM LUTHERAN CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING January 22, 2022

Call to order at 9:44 am. Pastor opened with a prayer.

Present: see sign in list

Agenda: Brent/m, Enos/s, /c to approve.

2021 annual meeting minutes: Al/m, Jone/s, /c to approve. Special meeting minutes: Meagan/m, Brent/s, /c to approve.

Pastor's report: Pastor reported on number of funerals, weddings and baptisms that were performed in

2021.

Old business:

- changing the constitution requiring number of council members from 9 to 6 to more reflect the change in reduced church members. Instead of replacing 3 people every year, if passed we will only be voting on 2 new council members each year to serve 3-year terms. Needs to be voted on twice, the first vote was done during special meeting last fall. Second vote was done and passed 32 to 1 to change constitution. Will still need 6 council members present to do voting on any issues.

- Audit committee, Allan Smith, Connie Kleppe and Joan Kleppe conducted an audit of all financial books and found them all to be satisfactory. They all agreed to be on this committee for an additional 2yrs.

New business:

- Election ballot, Brent/m, Al/s, /c to approve unanimous ballot. New council and committee members therefore will be: Council – Tom Gerdes and Enos Ihns both 3-yr terms

Farm – Trisha Feuss 2-yr term

Mission Endowment – Jessica Willimack and Sue Zeller

- -Pay raises: Increase of 5% across the board.
- -Budget: Sue/m, Marlene/s, /c to approve budget.
- -Mission Endowment: Interest rate has dropped so they have less money to work with.

Trish/m, Jody/s,/c to approve.

<u>Parsonage repairs</u> – would like to tear out patio, to fix foundation and put in insulation were needed, also tear up sidewalk on south side, replace with 12×14 deck with stairs. Have an estimate from K&L construction for \$9245.00 to do the work, asked if anyone else would like to get an estimate, there is enough money in the parsonage fund to cover.

Questions were brought up on what materials are going to be used, such as will the deck be wood or composite and should the railing be vinyl or metal. The congregation requested that deck be made out of composite material if possible to keep it maintenance free as possible. These questions were going to be taken back to K&L. Trisha/m, Jim/s,/c to proceed with project unless new estimate comes back extremely higher with requested changes.

<u>Church maintenance</u> tile in the basement, Todd Till put in a bid of \$12,000.00 - \$13,500.00 to replace with a floating plank floor everywhere except the kitchen. Did not get a bid for epoxy floor because we would probably have to remove old tile and that would be extremely expensive because of asbestos. Questions about past water problems were brought up and discussed. Water doesn't appear to

coming up through the floor but does come down wall. Tile was laid outside to help with the problem but has not fixed it. Epoxy flooring came into discussion again and thought that maybe it could be done without removing old tile, if not may still have to find another type of floor because of the possibility of water coming in during wet season. There is approximately \$10,000.00 in savings for this project but we do have \$70,000.00 CD that could be an option to use for repair.

- -It was brought to congregation's attention that there was a project list posted in back of church if anyone wanted to help do things around the church that needed to be done.
- -will probably have to have AC units looked at this coming year.
- furnace repairs have done some but may have more expenses this year because of the age, 1997 was the last known replacement year.

Pastor closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Special Congregational Meeting

Sunday, March 20, 2022

Call to order following church service. Pastor opened with a prayer.

- -Discussion about parsonage and the option for the decking. The synthetic decking will be about \$2000 more than wood.
- -Discussion on the replacement of the three furnaces, four A/C units in church, and furnace and AC unit in parsonage. The furnace in the main church section was most recently replaced. The total to replace the remaining three furnaces, 4 A/Cs, and parsonage units will cost \$34,000. The church is tax exempt which will save us around \$2000. There was a question as to why we only had one quote for the furnaces. This is because only one company got back to us with a quote.
- -Discussion on removal of basement flooring and the options for replacement. There were several questions about the epoxy flooring. Is it slippery? How does it hold up? Is there a guarantee? A member who has had some experience with this type of flooring assured us that it is very durable and non-slippery. If we went with this option, old tile with asbestos would have to be removed.
- -A member asked if there was a reason as to why we could not proceed with all three projects. It was mentioned that prices will likely continue to rise so it may be a good option to do all three right away.

Jone Paarmann/m to do all 3 projects with removal of tile/asbestos and putting in the epoxy flooring. Connie Kleppe/s, /c

Once again I feel compelled to recognize how interesting this last year has been. With a grateful heart I can recognize how it has been one much easier to wrap my head around that the last few years. Instead of so much uncertainty and double checking, this one has been one of both change and development, while grounded in the recognition of what it means to remain a community in the midst of change.

While we have been active in many and various ways, I encourage us all to see- and remember to our work as a reflection of- ourselves as workers for one purpose: to be the hands feet of God's Kingdom in our own ways and means, with the skills and abilities that we have been given (1 Corinthians 12:1-31). For this, we have been tasked, and for this we can remember how we have returned to this calling along the way.

Amid an ever-changing we have embarked on may projects, both in our own building and for those in our communities. In the last few weeks, we have returned to the projects that have given us purpose and a reminder to see ourselves as a part of God's work in and for the world around us. In the last few weeks, we have returned to the hard work of stitching together the fabrics that will bring warmth where people have experienced cold in the form of quilts and coveralls for the homeless, gathering food for those that hunger for our community Food Pantry, items of need for those that flee from violence and seek refuge within the walls of DVIP, and even trying to offer the joys of Christmas giving this year for a family in need within our own community.

In our work in these may large- and seemingly small- ways we continue to be engaged in the work that God has called us to engage for the sake of a world in need. And yet, however small, our acts respond to the needs of the Christ in disguise in our midst; no matter how small or miniscule, we are called to remember that what we do for the least among us, we do for Christ (Matthew 25:31-46)."

2022 Project Summary Report

March 20, 2022 – Congregational Meeting - approved three major projects

Parsonage Project

Details: remove concrete patio & sidewalk; fix insulation issue under laundry room; replace patio with synthetic decking & railing

Initial estimate: \$11,245.00

Congregation approved upgrading to synthetic decking instead of wood for approx. \$2000 additional

Furnace / AC Project

Details: replace 3 furnaces in church & 1 in parsonage, replace 4 AC units in church & 1 in parsonage

Initial estimate: \$34,000 (\$36,000 with tax)

Congregation approved upgrading all units

Basement Project

Details: removal of asbestos flooring, replace with new flooring

Initial estimate: \$11,000 for epoxy + \$7150 asbestos abatement vs. \$12,000 vinyl flooring

Congregation approved removal of all tile & asbestos and replace with epoxy

April 2022 – Furnace & AC units replaced – project complete - \$36,334.03 (tax included)

August 2022 – **Basement – tile & asbestos removed -** \$6,900.00

September 2022 – Basement – epoxy installed (including closets) - \$11,457.00

October 2022 – Parsonage project completed (more foundation work than anticipated; dirt work; lattice finishing) - \$16,190.13

Total Expenses of all three projects - \$70,881.16

BWELCA 2022 REPORT

Quilting began Mon. Jan. 3 with the return of our potluck noon meal, and some gathered on Wednesdays also through Mar. 28, about 12-15 in all. Our diligent crew churned out another record of 221 quilts, surpassing last year by 11 as well as ½ dozen or so of pillows! Amazing!!! We were very appreciative of the kitchen crew of guys who cleaned up and delivered meals.

The quilts were sent to LWR, Domestic Violence in Ia. City, the King House and High Tower in Clinton, LSI in Davenport, Clinton, Dubuque, and Muscatine, Camp EWALU Quilt Auction in Strawberry Point, Catholic, Lutheran, and Presbyterian churches in Lost Nation, and 2 Quilts of Valor were gifted at the Lost Nation Legion Veterans Day Program.

We hosted the Annual Cheer brunch on Sat. Feb.5, after a year off due to Covid. We enjoyed our speaker Pam Behr who shared her experience packing LWR kits at the New Windsor, Md. Warehouse. Our ladies packed and delivered 29 cheer plates.

The Friendship Party was held on Feb.19, after a year off due to Covid. 37 men, women, and children attended and enjoyed tacos, ice cream, and bingo.

The World Day of Prayer was observed on Mar.6 with a noisy offering of \$83.40, which included \$25 of our annual budget. England, Wales, and Northern Ireland were the focal countries this year.

The Lenten Soup Suppers also were resumed after a 2 year break due to Covid. They were held on Mar.9,16,23,30 and Apr. 6.

We, along with the Sunday School kids, packed 64 Baby Care kits and 80 Personal Care kits in March. They were delivered to LWR along with the quilts.

The Spring Quilt Display and Luncheon with bake sale was held on Apr.2.

The Senior/Senior celebration was held on Sunday May 1 and hosted by Eve Circle. There were no graduating seniors this year, but we had 10 senior members attend.

Spring Church cleaning was put on hold as the basement floor project date was pending.

The Community Coffee was held June 16 after a 2 year break due to Covid.

The Ice Cream Social was held June 26 with dine in and drive through.

We hosted the Rustic Days Brunch following the Ecumenical Service on July 17. Around 65 attended.

Restrictions prevented us from serving a meal at the DVIP shelter, but we gave a monetary gift towards meals for them and delivered that along with cookies, bars, watermelon, and items from their needs list.

The EWALU Quilt Auction was held Sept. 24 and Bethlehem's quilts brought \$1155.00.

We packed 128 school kits in September and October for LWR along with the help of the Sunday School kids.

In Oct. & Nov. we concentrated on cleaning the kitchen as it received most of the mess from the basement floor replacement.

In November, we and the Sunday School kids packed 36 emergency care kits for the DVIP Center.

Other Fall events were: treat the Food Pantry, The Harvest table, Thankoffering Service led by the Mission Community/Justice Committee.

On December 4, we decorated the Church for Christmas and enjoyed brunch for our Joint Circle Christmas Party at the Pub.

We've kept busy pretty much all year and were happy to get back to the "NORMAL" way of doing things again!

Thanks to everyone for all their hard work, we are so blessed to have such a wonderful congregation – from our seniors all the way to the Sunday School kids!

Farm Committee 2022

In July, the Farm Committee met as a group. The committee also met with Council to share information about the past practices of the committee, how the process works, and any other questions council and/or the congregation had. Council said they were happy with current tenant as discussed at the June meeting and were not in support of asking for other bids for the farm. The committee discussed and decided to offer a 3-year lease. This would allow the tenant a better opportunity to plan for longer term management of the farm. The current and past year's leases were for a single year. The Farm Committee met with Keith Dexter in early August as is standard practice. Keith discussed his management practices of the farm and answered any questions the committee had. The tenant expressed understanding and agreement with terms of the lease and the timeframe. The rates were set as follows: 2023 payment \$48,279.90, 2024 payment 50,617.70, and 2025 payment 53,189.50 with payments due March and October 1st of the respective year.

Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.
