Shepherding Thoughts,

My child, do not forget my teaching, but let your heart keep my commandments; for the length of days and years of life and abundant welfare they will give you.

Proverbs 3:1-2

I recently read an article about two women who lived to be 104 years old. One woman did aerobics, ate vegetables, and had many friends. She looked at aging as a blessing. The other woman was a homebody with few friends, she found comfort in her faith and family and thought of life as something to endure. These women were exact opposites, yet both lived a long life.

When these women were young, living to 100 was rare. In the 1950's only about 2,300 Americans reached that milestone. In 2024, more than 101,000 Americans celebrated their 100th birthday and by 2054, that number is expected to reach 422,000. This is causing scientists to reexamine why people are living longer and they have discovered three hidden keys.

The first is resilience. People who are mentally tough, especially women, tend to live longer. They stay calm under pressure, keep going even in tough times, and feel that life has purpose. The second is love. It is important to have strong social connections. The bond formed between you and other people is important. Loneliness can be as harmful to your health as smoking or alcoholism.

The third and the one I find most hopeful is faith. It has been said that you can't live to an old age without a belief system. It is important that you have the conviction that tomorrow holds promise. How better to get that feeling of hope in tomorrow than to put your faith in God. God has given us the promise of eternal life. It is that belief that helps us remember the best is yet to come.

Belonging to a church family gives you resilience, love and faith. We know that not everyone will live to be 100. There are factors that shorten lives. But no matter how long you live, I believe you will live a better life if you find a place where you are accepted and loved. I invite you to come to worship, form bonds with those in your faith community, and know that God's grace and mercy will carry you through all the days of your life.
